Students & Visitors

Dorelle Dushime: This month we welcomed Dorelle who will be spending one month with Omni Med focusing on the role of VHTs in primary antenatal care and healthy pregnancy. This will be part of her practicuum project for her Masters in Global Health at Northwestern.

Community Health Talks



This month we held a community health talk in Gobero village. The attendance included 45 villagers and 3 VHTs. The staff educated the community on HIV/AIDS including symptoms, testing, treatment and stigmatization. The community members had excellent questions on the topic including specific questions regarding treatment options.

Cookstove Project

Staff welcomed **Mike Sommer**, a founder of The Cookstove Project, to Omni Med on January 8. We have been partnering with The Cookstove Project since 2013 to address the impact of traditional open cooking fires in Mukono. VHTs trained by Omni Med have been instrumental to building cookstoves. Contained cookstoves help to prevent exposure to harmful smoke to decrease the risk of pneumonia and other lung diseases. We look forward to a continued partnership in the years to come!



Protected Water Sources



Girls fetch water from a borehole. After carrying the water back to their homes it will need to be boiled before it is safe to drink.

Construction of protected water sources (PWS) allows for villagers to access water with minimal contamination from livestock, people and the environment. Omni Med has built 30 PWS's throughout Mukono and we plan to continue building one per quarter. In January, we visited Kakuba to assess the feasibility of building a PWS for their community. The village currently has 4 water sources including one borehole and 3 unprotected water sources. Based on our visit, we determined that one of the unprotected water sources would be an eligible site to build a PWS. Next, Henry will coordinate a meeting with the community leader and VHTs to determine the next steps for water source construction and participation.
